**B**ACK in 1895, the first professor of *Law of the Orphans' Court* in the School of Law, was Mr. Thomas Herriott. The vacancy caused by Mr. Herriott's death was filled in 1906, by the appointment of Jacob Jay Miller then the second associate Judge of the Orphans' Court. Judge Miller, through advancing responsibilities of Associate and then President of his Court, held steadfast and with increasing devotion to the vision of a higher, better and more efficient administration of and instruction in the law of the care of orphans and of the distribution of decedents' estates. Twice a week for twenty-two years Judge Miller appeared before his class—and nine hundred and forty-seven young attorneys throughout Western Pennsylvania can testify that those appearances were fruitful, fertile and full of inspiration. He had the vision and, to the best of his large abilities, heeded the cry: "Come over into Macedonia and help us."

## GENERAL INFORMATION

## FOREWORD

The provisions of this bulletin are not to be regarded as an irrevocable contract between the University and the student. The University reserves the right to change any provision or requirement at any time within the student's time of residence. The University further reserves the right, upon refunding to the student his tuition, to ask him to withdraw for cause at any time.

## HISTORY

The University of Pittsburgh was founded by charter from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as Pittsburgh Academy on February 28, 1787, to provide higher education in western Pennsylvania. Throughout its history, it has been partly supported by the state, in partnership with the public-spirited citizens of Pittsburgh. In 1819, a second charter was granted making the Western University of Pennsylvania the legal successor of the Pittsburgh Academy.

Until the last decade of the nineteenth century, the University gave little but collegiate and engineering training; but in 1890-1892, new buildings were erected on Observatory Hill, Allegheny, and a number of professional schools were organized or affiliated with the University. In 1908, the University purchased the present campus in Oakland, the educational and civic center of Pittsburgh, and the name was changed to the University of Pittsburgh, as being more appropriate to the community it serves. The institution thus has had in its various forms a continuous history of 142 years. Since 1910, the University has grown from 1,200 resident students to more than 10,000. About 8,000 of these are full-time students. It has a faculty of 835 persons, and annually confers more than 1,000 degrees in course. The great majority of its 14,000 living alumni practice their professions and make their homes in western Pennsylvania. A more complete history will be found in the General Catalog.

The University includes the following schools and departments: the College, Allegheny Observatory, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Pharmacy, Dentistry, Mines, Education, Business Administration, the Graduate School, University Extension, Downtown Division, the Mellon Institute, the Research Bureau for Retail Training, the Division of Research in Higher Education, and the Radio Studio.

The College is the oldest school of the University and is closely affiliated through its faculty and its curriculum with all the other schools. The regular curricula of the College are four years in

length and lead to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, and Bachelor of Science in Chemistry. It is possible to complete the course in less than four years by attendance during the summer.

Engineering degrees were first granted at the University in 1846; and though the School of Engineering was not formally organized until later, it offered one of the first engineering courses in the United States. The fields covered by the School's four-year courses are Civil, Mechanical, Electrical, Chemical, and Industrial Engineering. Every student in the School of Engineering is required during his course to work a total of nine months in assigned positions in engineering industries of the Pittsburgh district. This work is supervised by instructors in the School. The student is paid by the company employing him. During the time since 1910 that this co-operative system has been in effect, relations have been maintained, at various times, with approximately 125 industries.

The School of Mines, established in 1895, grants the Bachelor of Science degree in the following branches: Mining Engineering, Metallurgy, Petroleum Geology, Petroleum Engineering, and Petroleum Refining. Courses in the School are for four years. The School's courses in oil and gas production and in petroleum refining were the first to be given in any American university.

Students in the School of Business Administration are granted the Bachelor of Science degree upon the satisfactory completion of a four-year course. Evening classes give employed students the same opportunities offered to day students. The School gives special preparation for the Pennsylvania Certified Public Accountant, and the American Institute of Accountants' examinations.

Through a bureau of research the School is working on a wide frontage to find a scientific solution for various business problems.

The School of Education offers four-year courses leading to the bachelor degrees in Arts and in Science. The first two years of the courses are completed in the College. Students are prepared for the following positions: city and county superintendents, elementary and high school principals, teachers of academic subjects in high schools, teachers and supervisors in elementary schools, clinical psychologists and teachers of exceptional children, and industrial and vocational teachers. A definite amount of practice teaching under supervision in the schools of the community is required for graduation.

The Graduate School is organized for productive research. During 1927-28, 222 members of the Graduate School staff were at work on 459 separate investigations. Graduate courses are open to students holding a bachelor's degree from the University of Pittsburgh or from other approved institutions. For the master's degree a minimum of one full year of resident work and a thesis

are required. At least three years are required for the doctorate. At least one of these years must be spent in residence and the candidate must produce a dissertation of distinct value as a contribution to knowledge.

Research assistance in solving the educational problems which have developed with the rapid expansion of the University is given by the Division of Research in Higher Education. The Division in addition offers courses for persons interested in studying problems of higher education. Typical problems undertaken by the Division have been: studies of university costs, educational surveys for junior colleges, and the organization and conduct of a reading clinic.

The School of Medicine has been ranked in Class A by the American Medical Association since that organization began its classification of medical schools. It is the only medical school between Philadelphia and Cleveland. With it are affiliated for clinical work The Pittsburgh Free Dispensary and the Mercy, St. Francis, Allegheny General, Municipal, Tuberculosis League, Children's, and Elizabeth Steel Magee Hospital. The last named is under the direct control of the faculty and carries on a 100-bed maternity dispensary. The Children's Hospital now has its new \$1,500,000 building on University property, the first unit of a group which will become the Pittsburgh Medical Center. The Pittsburgh Free Dispensary is operated by the school of medicine and during the past the number of persons taking advantage of its free service totaled more than 48,700. The entrance requirement to the School of Medicine is the completion of two years of recognized college work. The medical course is four years in length, with an additional intern year in the hospitals required by the state.

The School of Law is ranked by the Association of American Law Schools as a Class A institution. It is strictly graduate in character, being with Harvard and Pennsylvania, one of three law schools that require a bachelor's degree for entrance. The course is three years in length. The school is located downtown in close proximity to the courts and to the Allegheny County Law Library.

The School of Pharmacy is the third largest school of its kind in the United States. The Pharmacy courses, three years in length, lead to the degree of Graduate in Pharmacy. A post-graduate course of one year is optional. Every student is required to complete three years of practical work in a dispensing pharmacy before receiving his degree.

The School of Dentistry, listed as a Class A institution, ranks as the largest dental school in the world. Its graduates, in the passage of state board examinations throughout the Union, have had a lower percentage of failures than those of any other school. The clinical work of the school is unique, more than 75,000 pa-

tients having been given treatment in the main infirmary on the campus and thousands of patients having been treated in the forty-two clinics maintained by the School in hospitals, orphanages, etc. The minimum requirement for admission to the freshman pre-dental class is the satisfactory completion of a standard four-year high school course. The course is five years in length. At the end of four years of satisfactory work the degree of Bachelor of Science is conferred and the degree of Doctor of Dental Surgery is conferred at the satisfactory completion of the five years.

The Allegheny Observatory, located in Riverview Park, N. S., is devoted to astronomical research, its principal field being the determination of star distances by photography. It is the largest institution of its kind within a radius of 400 miles. More than 6,000 visitors view the heavens every year through the 13-inch telescope devoted exclusively to public service.

The Mellon Institute of Industrial Research is a center for the solutions of the varied problems of industrial chemistry. It was established in 1913 by Andrew and Richard B. Mellon as a memorial to their father, Judge Thomas Mellon, an alumnus of the University, and to Dr. Robert Kennedy Duncan. The institute has demonstrated to more than 3,000 American manufacturers that industrial research is profitable. Eighty-five per cent. of all the problems accepted for study have been solved. A staff of 140 highly trained chemists is working continuously on 62 fellowships. About 400 United States patents have been granted for discoveries made in the institute. Students who wish to prepare themselves for research in industrial chemistry should take a regular collegiate course, specializing in chemistry.

The Research Bureau for Retail Training is a co-operative organization on a graduate basis, supported by ten Pittsburgh department stores and 21 stores in other cities for the solution of their problems of personnel and sales training. Most students admitted to the Bureau have received their bachelors' degrees, but a limited number of mature persons of sufficient practical experience may be chosen. The Research Bureau Bulletin may be obtained from the Registrar.

Through the Extension Division, members of the faculty give courses for adults in cities scattered from Erie to Uniontown, Pennsylvania, and from Johnstown, Pennsylvania, to Steubenville, Ohio. The division furnishes speakers, conducts surveys, directs scholastic, oratorical, and athletic contests, runs a teacher appointment bureau, and acts as a general clearing house for community problems. Centers, that include junior colleges, are at Johnstown, Uniontown and Erie and are under the supervision of the Division.

For men and women who are employed during the day, the University conducts its Downtown Division in the Chamber of

Commerce Building. Regular class instruction of the same quality and credit as that of the campus is given in the late afternoon and in the evening.

In co-operation with station KDKA, Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company, the University maintains a radio studio on the campus. The programs for the most part are talks given by members of the faculty and guest speakers. Hundreds of letters received at the studio indicate that the radio campus extends over both of the American continents and across the Atlantic Ocean to Russia and beyond and even in South Africa, Java, China, and India.

#### THE SCHOOL OF LAW

The first professorship in law in the University was created in 1843 with the appointment of the Honorable Walter H. Lowrie of the class of 1826, later Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, as Professor of Law; and courses in law were conducted until about 1850.

In 1862, the vacant professorship in law was filled by the appointment of the Honorable Moses Hampton, President Judge of the District Court of Allegheny County. He was succeeded the following year by Henry Williams, Esq., subsequently a justice of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, who delivered lectures in law until 1870, when they were again discontinued.

The School of Law was organized as a department of the old Western University under the name of the Pittsburgh Law School in October, 1895, with the late Honorable John D. Shafer as Dean. With the granting of the new charter in 1908 the Pittsburgh Law School became the School of Law of the University of Pittsburgh.

#### LOCATION

The School of Law is located on the tenth floor of the Chamber of Commerce Building, Pittsburgh. Its quarters are in the downtown section, near the City-County Building and Allegheny County Court House, where the Court of Common Pleas, the Orphans' Court, and the County Court of Allegheny County are quartered, and where the Supreme and Superior Courts of Pennsylvania meet each year, when sitting in this district. It is also near the Federal Building, where the District Court of the United States is held.

Pittsburgh is excelled by few cities in its advantages for both the study and the practice of law. By reason of the mercantile and manufacturing supremacy of Pittsburgh and the vast number and extent of its industries, litigation is more varied in character and more important than in most jurisdictions. The Common Pleas Court, which has fourteen judges; the Orphans' Court, having three judges; the County Court, with six judges; together with



the United States and the Appellate State Courts, give the student exceptional opportunities to familiarize himself with court practice.

#### CLASSES

The classes of the School of Law are held from 9:30 in the morning until 4:40 in the afternoon. No classes are held at night.

#### ADMISSION

Candidates for admission to the School of Law are required to submit evidence of having received a bachelor's degree, after the completion of a four-year course in an approved college or university.

Students who expect to practice in Pennsylvania must register with the State Board of Law Examiners upon the commencement of their legal studies.

**On graduation from college the prospective law student should apply immediately to Walter C. Douglass, Secretary of the State Board of Law Examiners, 1015 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, for a copy of the rules for registration, and for the necessary blanks. It should be noted that new rules became effective January 1, 1928, under which the procedure for registration has been materially changed. Students during their period of registration with the State Board as law students and before admission to the Bar must spend at least six months of full-time study in the office of a preceptor, an attorney of the county in which they propose to practice.**

*Advanced Standing.* An applicant for admission to any other than the first-year class of the School of Law must present satisfactory evidence of having been in regular attendance for the number of years for which credit is asked, at a law school whose standing is satisfactory to the faculty of this School, and of having satisfactorily completed the courses of study required in that institution during those years. The applicant must also comply with the entrance requirements of this School as to preliminary education. Admission to advanced standing is subject to such conditions as the circumstances require in order to adjust the courses of study.

All candidates for admission to the School must use the form of application prescribed by the faculty.

The School of Law of the University of Pittsburgh is registered with the New York State Board of Regents, and completion of the course in the School satisfies the requirement of preparation for the New York State Board law examinations. The School admits for advanced standing only students who come from law schools registered with the New York State Board of Regents.

The School of Law of the University of Pittsburgh is a member of the Association of American Law Schools and all its rules are to be read in harmony with the rules of that Association.

#### DEGREES

On completing the full course of study prescribed by the faculty, a student is granted the degree of Bachelor of Laws.

#### TUITION AND FEES

The annual tuition in the School of Law is \$300.00, payable in two installments, \$150.00 upon registration at the opening of the first semester and \$150.00 upon registration for the second semester.

The tuition entitles the student to admission to all athletic events under the auspices of the University and to certain other events under the jurisdiction of the Advisory Board of Student Activities.

A fee of \$5.00 is added to the tuition if registration is not completed within the dates specified.

A fee of \$5.00 is charged for each special examination or re-examination.

A graduation fee of \$10.00 is payable before graduation by each candidate for a degree.

#### REFUNDS

Students who withdraw from the University for a satisfactory reason before the end of the eighth week of the semester may request a proportionate refund of tuition. Application for a refund will be considered only when made at the time of withdrawal.

#### RULES OF THE FACULTY IN REGARD TO GRADING AND EXAMINATIONS

1. All examinations are conducted according to the honor system, under the control of the student body. As a condition of admission in signing application, students agree to support the honor system of conducting examination which is in force in this School.

2. The minimum grade required in every course for passing is sixty per cent. To complete a year's work a student is required to pass every course, to make a general average of sixty-five per cent., and to attend eighty per cent. of the lectures and recitations in each course for the year.

3. In computing the general average, credit is given to courses according to approximate number of hours.

3 hrs., 1st and 2d sem.

The formation of contracts; their operation, inter parties and as to strangers; the discharge of contracts. Williston's *Cases on the Law of Contracts* (2d edition).

Trespass, ejectment, case, trover, replevin, assumpsit, debt, covenant, detinue. Concerning substance and form. Defects. Dilatory objections. Cross demands. Sunderland's *Cases on Common Law Pleading*.

## PERSONAL PROPERTY

2 hrs., 1st sem.

Distinction between personal and real property; nature of and rights based upon possession; some methods of acquiring title to chattels; liens and pledges; conversion. A casebook course based on Bigelow's *Cases on Personal Property*.

## REAL PROPERTY

2 hrs., 2d sem.

After a short introductory textbook and lecture course, titles, estates and methods of conveyancing are studied from cases. Bigelow's *Introduction of Real Property*; Aigler's *Cases on Titles to Real Property*.

2 hrs., 1st and 2d sem.

Nature of crimes; intent and act; capacity to commit crimes and defenses thereto; historical development of crimes and statutory changes. Sayre's *Cases on Criminal Law*.

## EQUITY

3 hrs. 2d sem.

2 hrs., 1st and 2d sem.

Origin, history, and jurisdiction of Orphans' Court; procedure other than in audits; letters of administration; letters testamentary; contests thereon before the Register; appeal on contests before the Court; inventory; accounts; audits; claims and contests arising thereon; evidence; collateral and direct inheritance taxes; the Intestate Act; the Wills Act; sales of real estate for payment of debts; sales, etc., of real estate under the Price Act; partitions; guardians and wards; removal and discharge of fiduciaries; non-resident and foreign fiduciaries; abatement and survival of actions; powers under wills; lien of debts of decedents; widows' and children's exemption; presumed decedents; estates; legacies; trusts. #### PENNSYLVANIA CONVEYANCING LAW

2 hrs., 1st sem.

This course supplements the Real Property courses. A printed book of notes by Richard H. Hawkins, Esq., is used as the basis of the course. The purpose is to study in detail the rules of real property and conveyancing in Pennsylvania. The course includes a history of land titles of Pennsylvania; the various estates in lands; mortgages and other liens; coal, oil, and other mineral rights; acquisition of titles; alienation; abstracts of title; taxation of real estate.

#### EVIDENCE

2 hrs., 1st sem.; 3 hrs., 2d sem.

The course includes relevancy, judicial notice; burden of proof and presumptions; admissions and confessions; opinion evidence; the hearsay rule and its exceptions; writings; witnesses, their privileges, disqualifications, and examination, including the offer, objection, and exception. Case system of instruction, using *Wigmore's Select Cases on Evidence* (2d edition).

2 hrs., 1st and 2d sem.

Jurisdiction of law over persons and things; jurisdiction of courts, in rem, in personam, quasi in rem, and for divorce; remedies, including rights of action and procedure; creation of rights, including personal rights, rights of property, inheritance, obligations ex delicto, obligations ex contractu; recognition and enforcement of rights, including personal relations, property, inheritance, administration of estates, judgments, and obligations. 2 hrs., 1st sem.

A lecture course in Pennsylvania statutes relative to workmen's compensation; mechanic's liens; divorce.
