FOREWORD

The provisions of this bulletin are not to be regarded as an irrevocable contract between the student and the University. The University reserves the right to change any provision or requirement at any time within the student's term of residence. The University further reserves the right to ask him to withdraw *for cause* at any time.

HISTORY

Eleven years after the signing of the Declaration of Independence, the University of Pittsburgh was founded. The original charter, dated February 28, 1787, named the institution as Pittsburgh Academy. In 1819, a second charter was granted making the Western University of Pennsylvania the legal successor to the Pittsburgh Academy. In 1908, the University moved to its present location in Oakland and the more appropriate name, the University of Pittsburgh, was adopted. The institution thus has had in its various forms a continuous history of 151 years.

Until the last decade of the nineteenth century, the University gave little but collegiate and engineering training; but, in 1890-1892, a number of professional schools were organized or affiliated with the University. Since that time, other schools and divisions have been established until there are now 17.

Since 1910, the University has grown from 1,200 resident students to approximately 12,000. About 6,500 of these are full-time students. It has a faculty of 875 persons and confers annually more than 1,600 degrees in course. The great majority of its 25,000 living alumni practice their professions and make their homes in western Pennsylvania.

ORGANIZATION

The University includes the following schools and divisions: The College, Schools of Engineering, Mines, Business Administration, and Education; Graduate School; Schools of Medicine, Law, Pharmacy, and Dentistry; the Allegheny Observatory, Summer Sessions, Mellon Institute of Industrial Research, University Extension Division; Late Afternoon, Evening, and Saturday Classes; Research Bureau for Retail Training, Bureau of Business Research, and the Division of Social Work.

SCHOOL OF LAW

The first professorship in law in the University was created in 1843 with the appointment of the Honorable Walter H. Lowrie, of the class of 1826, later Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, as Professor of Law; and courses in law were conducted until about 1850.

In 1862, the vacant professorship in law was filled by the appointment of the Honorable Moses Hampton, President Judge of the District Court of Allegheny County. He was succeeded the following year by Henry Williams, Esq., subsequently a justice of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, who delivered lectures in law until 1870, when they were again discontinued.

The School of Law was organized as a department of the old Western University of Pennsylvania, under the name of the Pittsburgh Law School, in October, 1895, with the late Honorable John D. Shafer as Dean. With the granting of the new charter in 1908, the Pittsburgh Law School became the School of Law of the University of Pittsburgh.

LOCATION

The Law School is located in one of the most unique academic structures ever erected. It is a building forty-two stories high and is known as the Cathedral of Learning. The portion of this building assigned to the School of Law embraces the fourteenth, fifteenth, and sixteenth floors. The quarters of the School are well lighted, well ventilated, and quiet, and they have a beautiful outlook.

CLASSES

The classes of the School of Law are held from 9:15 o'clock in the morning until 4:50 o'clock in the afternoon. No classes are held at night. The curriculum is arranged with the expectation that all students are able to attend both morning and afternoon classes.

ADMISSION

Candidates for admission to the School of Law are required to submit evidence of having received a bachelor's degree upon the completion of a four-year course in an approved college or university. Admission is subject to the approval of the Faculty who reserve the right to exclude any applicant who does not appear to possess sufficient aptitude to pursue the study of law successfully.

Each new student is required to file a transcript of his college or university record, and a photograph, passport size, with the Registrar of the Law School. This should be done by September 1.

Students who expect to practice in Pennsylvania must register with the State Board of Law Examiners upon the commencement of their legal studies.

While a senior in college, the prospective law student should communicate with George F. B. Appel, Secretary of the State Board of Law Examiners, 1632 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, for a copy of the rules for registration and for the necessary blanks.

ADVANCED STANDING

An applicant for admission to any other than the first-year class of the School of Law must present satisfactory evidence of having been in regular attendance, for the number of years for which credit is asked, at a law school whose standing is satisfactory to the faculty of this School, and of having satisfactorily completed the courses of study required in that institution during those years. The applicant must also comply with the entrance requirements of this School as to preliminary education. Admission to advanced standing is subject to such conditions as the circumstances require in order to adjust the courses of study.

All candidates for admission to the School must use the form of application prescribed by the faculty.

The School of Law of the University of Pittsburgh is a member of the Association of American Law Schools and all its rules are to be read in harmony with the rules of that Association.

TUITION AND FEES

The basic charge for all courses includes tuition and a student activities fee. The annual total of this charge in the School of Law is \$300, payable in two installments, \$150 upon registration at the opening of the first semester and \$150 upon registration for the second semester. The student, in making payment of this basic charge, is contributing $8\frac{1}{3}$ per cent of the payment to a general Student Activities and Health Service Fund. The balance of the payment is for tuition and for the use of classroom equipment. Each student paying \$150 in a semester is entitled to the student activities book, the value of which is stated in the following paragraph.

The Activities Book includes admission to athletic events and certain other events under the jurisdiction of the Advisory Board on Student Activities. It includes also a subscription to the *Pitt News*, the student newspaper. Students carrying less than the

normal schedule may purchase a Student Activities Book for \$15 in the first semester and for \$10 in the second semester.

Students in the School of Law receive, in addition to the above mentioned benefits, copies of the *University of Pittsburgh Law Review* free of charge.

The basic charge at the University of Pittsburgh includes all fees for instruction, student activities, student health service, and for the use of equipment.

A fee of \$5.00 is added to the tuition if registration is not completed within the dates specified.

A fee of \$5.00 is charged for each special examination or re-examination.

A graduation fee of \$10 is payable before graduation by each candidate for a degree.

DEGREES

On satisfactorily completing the full course of study prescribed by the faculty, a student is granted the degree of Bachelor of Laws.

REFUNDS

Students who withdraw from the University for a satisfactory reason before the end of the eighth week of the semester may request a refund of tuition. Application for a refund will be considered only when made at the time of withdrawal.

RULES OF THE FACULTY IN REGARD TO GRADING AND EXAMINATIONS

1. All examinations are conducted according to the honor system, under the control of the student body. As a condition of admission in signing application, students agree to support the honor system of conducting examination which is in force in this School.

2. The minimum grade required in every course for passing is 60 per cent. To complete a year's work a student is required to pass every course, to make a general average of 70 per cent, and to attend 80 per cent of the lectures and recitations in each course for the year.

3. In computing the general average, credit is given to courses according to approximate number of hours.

4. Students receive grades by letter as follows:

85-100	A
75-84	B
70-74	C
60-69	D
Below 60	E

5. Students having an average of "A" for the entire three years receive their degrees "with honor."

6. Students who have failed in one or more examinations or failed to obtain the average required for advancement are excluded from the school, permitted to repeat the year, or permitted to continue with their respective classes on condition, in accordance with standing Faculty rules as applied to the student's record. Re-examinations for delinquent students are taken with the regular examinations in course, except in the cases of seniors.

CONDUCT

The faculty of the School of Law reserves the right to exclude at any time students whose conduct or academic standing it regards as undesirable, and in such cases the fees due or which may have been paid in advance to the School will not be refunded or remitted in whole or in part.

BULLETIN BOARD

A bulletin board is maintained on which all official notices are posted, and such notices are considered personal notices to the student or students concerned.

FELLOWSHIP

At the close of the school year a fellowship may be awarded to that member of the graduating class who has attended the full course of three years, and who is, in the judgment of the faculty, qualified by scholarship and other attainments to perform the duties of the office. Each fellow is appointed for one year and performs such duties as are assigned to him by the faculty, receiving for his services the sum of \$500.

MOOT COURT AND STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

Students in the School are given opportunities to take part in moot court arguments in Law Clubs and fraternities. Inter-Fraternity and Law Club arguments are conducted in competition for the 1925 cup.

There are three national legal fraternities and one law club in the School: Phi Delta Phi, Phi Alpha Delta, Tau Epsilon Rho, and the Legal Eagle Law Club. The cup was won in 1937 by the Legal Eagle Law Club.

ORDER OF THE COIF

A chapter in the honorary Order of the Coif is attached to this School and members are elected each year from the first tenth of the senior class.

SUMMER SCHOOL

During past years summer courses have been offered when there seemed to be an adequate student demand. The offering of such courses in the future will be regulated likewise by the apparent need.

LAW REVIEW

The University of Pittsburgh *Law Review* is published quarterly under the direction of a student board of editors in co-operation with the faculty.

Crane and Magruder's *Cases on Partnership and Other Unincorporated Business Associations*, Shorter Selection.

Origin, history, and jurisdiction of Orphans' Court; procedure other than in audits; letters of administration; letters testamentary; contests thereon before the register; appeal on contests before the Court; inventory; accounts; audits, claims, and contests arising thereon; evidence; collateral and direct inheritance taxes; the Intestate Act; the Wills Act; sales of real estate for payment of debts; sales, etc., of real estate under the Price Act; partitions; guardians and wards; removal and discharge of fiduciaries; non-resident and foreign fiduciaries; abatement and survival of actions; powers under wills; lien of debts of decedents; widow's and children's exemption; presumed decedents; estates; legacies; trusts. A lecture course, with a printed compilation of statutes and mimeographed list of cases.

The course includes relevancy, judicial notice; burden of proof and presumptions; admissions and confessions; opinion evidence—and hearsay rule and its exceptions; writings; witnesses, their privileges, disqualifications, and examination, including the offer, objection, and exception. *Wigmore's Select Cases on Evidence* (3d edition).
